

Happy Tales Recent Adoptions



After a long drive from Santa Fe, we met him in his foster home. He was a most affectionate, excited, and healthy three-month old! Totally irresistible. I couldn't believe our good fortune to be given the opportunity to adopt this lively, little dog. Although we entered into the Westie Rescue program with the thought of adopting on older, more sedate Westie, we couldn't say no when we were offered this chance to start fresh.



It's been almost three months since that day and Bo has squirmed his way into almost every part of our lives. This is the story of a good dog with a bad reputation who avoided a terrible doom, and found his forever home. It is the story of how I proudly earned the title of 'failed foster'. It is the story of Westie Rescue Network at its best. It is a love story.



To be sure, I have fallen madly in love with all of the Westies I have fostered. What's not to madly love? We all know these dogs change our lives... but Casper, my third, made me rearrange mine to make a home for him when it was doubtful another could be found.

When Casper came to WRN, he had some strikes against him. He had attacked the other dogs in his home, and bitten one of his owners. No serious harm had occurred, but his people decided to let him go, in order to keep their other dogs safe, and their one-year-old child as well. I had time to offer my home and love to a new foster... Casper and I arrived simultaneously at the top of the lists.

What a prize! A 14-month-old male, a real beauty! Curly coat, well-muscled, in perfect health, crate trained and 100% housebroken. Best of all, Casper liked to be petted a lot, the first Westie in my experience that really loved physical attention. He bonded to me in about 3 days. I was already in love with him and I could not understand why his people gave him up!

I wanted to keep him, but I wasn't sure it would work, since I work as a house and pet sitter, and he would have to accompany me on the job... no way. Casper needed a home like mine, with one person and no other dogs. If no such home could be found, the alternative might have been euthanasia.

Casper remarkably improved steadily. WRN hired a trainer, Isaac Reeve, of Loving Leaders Dog Training. This training was the key factor in helping Casper. We learned to establish my authority over him, and to teach him to tolerate other animals and pets without instantly seeing them as threats.

I continued to love him with all my might, and took him to a job (with 3 other dogs) for 2 weeks... no dogs or humans were harmed. I adopted Casper just after we finished the job.

When Casper and I aren't working, we are walking. We both love to be outdoors. Casper makes sure that all the rabbits and squirrels and mice are in their proper places. He has dog friends who come to visit him and to play and wrestle in the grass. His neighbors love him dearly and bring him treats and toys which are always his favorites. He comes to me for cuddly love many times a day. Casper is a good good dog!

This story is a testament to the power of people working together to spread love in the world. It is a privilege to work with Westie Rescue Network, and to have opened my heart and my home to this dog... heart and home are all these wonderful creatures need!

DNA testing for Westies

Have you ever looked at your Westie and wondered if he/she was 100% Westie? Curiosity is just one reason to do DNA testing. When we got Maggie, we noticed she had a rather curly tail, which we found quite charming, but figured she



couldn't be 100/% Westie. One time we were walking with her, and met, Gibson, a dog that looked exactly like her, with the same curly tail. After chatting with the other dogs' folks, they told us they had done DNA testing, and the curly tail was Pomeranian. Interesting, and we thought-- "Ok, now we don't have to spend any money to find out about Maggie's curly tail."

Fast forward to 2022. Our friends, Minnie and Gene got Annabelle from a shelter, where she was listed as a "Westie mix." After looking at her, for sure she has lots of Westie, and probably a small amount of some other breeds--yes, a Westie mix. They decided to do a DNA test. It

Really? There are two well known DNA companies, Wisdom and Embark. Minnie & Gene used Wisdom. Now I was

came back with these results: 40% Poodle 20% Pomeranian 19% Chihuahua 9% Cocker Spaniel

5% Min. Pinscher

curious. I decided to use Embark. It comes highly recommended. The company says its breed results are 95% to 99% accurate. Once you get the kit, it is easy, painless, and fast. It is just a matter of collecting a cheek swab; so we sent Maggie's saliva to be tested. Maggie's results were:

100% West Highland Terrier!



I joined a FaceBook group, *Embark Dog DNA Discussion*, and found more interesting test results. Angela Sokiol has cute Oliver, who looks like another Westie mix, but here are his results:

42.9% Chihuahua
40.7% Miniature Schnauzer
5.8% Basset Hound
4% Pekingese
6.6% Super mutt (made up of only small poodle)

Angela says, "He does have characteristics that do not belong to Westies (I used to be a Cairn terrier owner so they were easy


for me to pick out)- such as a curled fluffy tail, light tan spots on his coat, and larger ears. If he had Westie DNA, he would have trended towards the known Westies in the Embark database. However, he did not lean in that manner at all." (See the chart on the next page.)

And Dianne sent for Abi's DNA. She also used Embark. Those results show Abi is 98% Westie, and 2% Cairn. We know Cairn is a close relative of West Highland White Terriers. Dianne said "I always loved Toto from the Wizard of Oz. Toto was a Cairn, named Terry. It is documented that she was the hardest working member of the cast. Perhaps Abi has a little of Toto/Terry in her." (3)

At Westie Fest we were talking to Marion and Mark, who have Cooper, the biggest "Westie," you've ever seen. They adopted him from a shelter. Their DNA story is hilarious. He is supposedly 100% Westie. That test was from a Canadian company. Marion said, "We had to send a picture, which was already a "red flag" and the DNA test came back as 100 % Westie."

They did a second DNA Test with Wisdom Panel, which their vet had recommended.

That test result was:

25 % Heeler

25 % Husky

25 % Mixed Breed

12.5 % Lab

12.5 % Westie (Yeah!)

Marion says, "All of his behavior now makes sense. He can be "iffy" just like a Heeler, he "talks" like a Husky, he ate everything when he was a puppy like a Lab, and has a little bit of the look of a Westie. . . . By the way, we got a refund from the first company."

What do you think?

Minnie and Gene are considering sending Annabelle's swab to Embark, just for comparison. Stay tuned.... perhaps I'll have more to report on the Back Page of a future newsletter.

In conclusion, it is kind of fun and exciting to actually know our dog's DNA, but it doesn't really matter. After all, these are rescue dogs. We usually don't know their history. What matters is that we love them, and they love us!
